Insurance Coverage Committee

The following cases represent the more relevant insurance coverage cases decided by the Ohio Supreme Court, federal courts, and lower state appellate courts in 2014. These summaries appear here chronologically in the order in which they were decided.*

1. INSURED ALLEGING LACK OF GOOD FAITH ENTITLED TO DISCOVER CLAIMS FILE MATERIALS CONTAINING ATTORNEY-CLIENT COMMUNICATIONS RELATED TO COVERAGE CREATED PRIOR TO DENIAL OF COVERAGE.

In DeMarco v. Allstate Insurance Co., 2014-Ohio-933 (8th App. Dist. Mar. 13, 2014), the Eighth District affirmed a trial court's denial of a motion for protective order regarding Allstate's claims file. Allstate had argued that the claims file was subject to the attorney client privilege and was protected under the work-product doctrine. The Eighth District disagreed.

Elizabeth DeMarco, Allstate's insured, sued Allstate after being involved in an automobile accident with an uninsured motorist. Among other things, Ms. DeMarco sought a declaration that her policy with Allstate covered damages caused by uninsured/underinsured motorists. She further alleged that Allstate had "refused to fully compensate" her and that this refusal "constitute[d] a breach of the terms and conditions of her policy with Allstate and a breach of its implied covenant to perform its obligations under the contract in good faith."

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Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity Discrimination in the Workplace

Recently, state and federal judges have been treading more and more into the murky waters of sexual orientation and the law. As a result, several have declared voter-enacted bans on same-sex marriage unconstitutional under either the Due Process Clause or the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment. Indeed, the legal winds of change seem to be shifting towards more widespread acceptance and accommodation of same-sex lifestyles. However, in the arena of employment law, change is moving at a slower pace. In fact, many state and federal courts, as well as the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), have been somewhat cautious to expand traditional workplace protections to gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender/transsexual (GLBT) employees alleging discriminatory employment practices on the basis of sexual orientation and/or gender identity. Yet, under certain circumstances, both Title VII and the state anti-discrimination statutes have been used to protect employees from "sexstereotyping" and gender-norming, two modes of workplace conduct that often encompass sexual orientation and gender identity discrimination.
